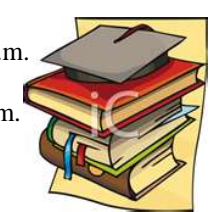

- **For morning tests, students should report to the testing site at 7:45 am.** The test will begin promptly at 8:00 am. **No one will be admitted after 8:00 am.**
- **For afternoon tests, students should report to the testing site at 11:45 am.** The test will begin promptly at 12:00 pm. **No one will be admitted after 12:00 pm.** Transportation home is the student's responsibility.
- **If there is a 1-hour DELAY, we will test 1 hour late. Please arrive at the site by 8:45 am.** *College Board will not allow the start of a morning test after 9 am.*

If you are absent the day of testing, please call Mrs. Melissa Freistat at the school (410-632-5180) to report that you will not be testing for the A.P. as scheduled. **When students do not test, the student will be charged with a \$13.00 fee to return the unused exam.**

SOCIAL STUDIES:

Students in Mrs. Suznavick's government class are preparing for the HSA test on Thursday, May 19th. It is important that your child be there the day of the test, so be sure to change any appointments your child may have that morning. Students do better on the test when they take it with their peers. Also, ask your child to work daily on vocabulary words. Those who prepare and take their time before the test will do well. Please encourage your child to do his/her best! After the HSA, students will be completing their Service Learning requirements. Their second project of ten hours should be completed by May 27th. After that time we will be working on the article requirements and their presentations. Thank you for your cooperation. Students in Mr. Serig's government class have recently taken their second Benchmark Assessment. In preparing for this assessment, students examined the legal system in the United States, including the due process rights included in the Constitution. Students researched landmark Supreme Court cases and presented these projects to the class. As we move closer to the High School Assessment (May 19th) students will be examining U.S. Foreign Policy and Economics. It is imperative that students study their notes and vocabulary in preparation for the High School Assessment. It is also important that students complete both Service Learning projects totaling twenty hours, as these are course requirements. Students in Mr. Serig's U.S. History class have recently completed an examination of the causes and outcomes of World War II. Students studied European and Japanese aggression in the 1920's and 1930's and the impact these aggressive actions had on causing World War II. Students focused on the U.S. policy of neutrality at the start of the conflict and the factors that caused the U.S. to officially enter the war in 1941. Parents and students are reminded of the ongoing portfolio projects, the book report project, and the research paper project. Students should be working diligently on all three assignments. Finally, Mr. Charles Heath, our student teacher from Salisbury University, has taken a leading role in the teaching of the class. Students in Mr. Serig's Advanced Placement United States History course have recently completed an analysis of the Industrial Revolution in the United States. Students focused on economic policies and theories that led to an industrial boom in the United States following the American Civil War. Students also studied the significance of European immigration to the U.S. as well as western



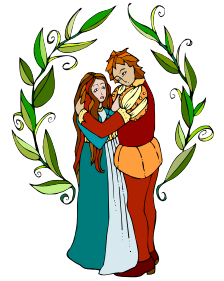
expansion and conflict with Native Americans. Students are reminded to continue studying for the national A.P. Exam to be given on Friday, May 6th. As the school year winds down it is especially important that students continue to keep up with assignments so that they can continue to keep their grades up. Parents are encouraged to check their child's progress online and to ask him/her to share what he/she is learning in class. The A.P. European History exam will be May 6th in the afternoon. Reviews are taking place in class and after school, but students should be studying at home every night as well. After the A.P. exam, students will complete research papers. As always, students and parents can contact Mrs. Springle at any time with questions. Congratulations to this year senior class from the social studies department. It has been a pleasure knowing you and having you in our classes. We look forward to great things in the years to come from all of you! Good Luck!

MATHEMATICS:

There will be an Algebra HSA Prep Rally on Tuesday, May 17th for all students who are taking the Algebra HSA. There are lots of activities planned for this exciting event so students, please make sure you're in school! The Algebra HSA will be held on Thursday, May 18th. Students, please remember to get a good night's sleep the night before and eat a healthy breakfast the morning of the test. The A.P. Calculus exam will be administered on Wednesday, May 4th at 8:00 a.m. Please make sure your son or daughter gets a good night's sleep and eats a good breakfast. A three hour test can be grueling on the mind and stomach! After the exam, students will be working on a video and power point project for the remainder of the year. Thank you for all your help and support this year in Calculus and AP Calculus.

ENGLISH:

English 9: Students have just finished reading and discussing Romeo and Juliet. The first week in May students will take a test to assess their understanding of the play and the Elizabethan Period. Students will finish the school year reading the novel, Great Expectations, by Charles Dickens and studying the Victorian Period. Students will have a reading schedule and activities that relate to the novel. Parents, please monitor your child/children to make sure they are reading the novel at home. Students have selected their final novel for book report #4 which will be due Wednesday, May 25th. They will also continue to study grammar and composition throughout the semester. Additionally, students will continue to analyze SAT practices which include passage-based readings, sentence combining, identifying sentence errors, improving paragraphs, and vocabulary. Students have already started reviewing for the English 9 End of Course Exam. A final exam review sheet has been provided for each student. Parents/Guardians, please check the daily objective given your child each day. It will help keep you informed of what goes on in class each day and make you aware of upcoming quizzes, tests, projects, and book reports. Also, remember you can check your child's progress by reviewing his/her grades on-line. Mrs. Eaton will be available after school on Tuesdays and Thursdays to assist students who need extra help. Please feel free to contact Mrs. Eaton if you have any concerns. Mr. Whitaker's English 10 students are working in Flex Groups on Mondays and Wednesdays to reinforce areas students had trouble with on Benchmark II. Students are working on individual areas of assessment while working together as a group with Short Stories. Mrs. Smith's British Literature classes have left behind the conformity and intellect of the Age of Reason and are enjoying the nature loving, spontaneity of the Romantic Age. Poetry by Blake, Wordsworth, Byron, Shelley and Keats fill our days, along with Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice*. The 3rd Independent Reading, a 20th century British work of literary merit, was due April 28th. A long-term assignment of reading *Brave New World* Chapters 1-6 is due May 2nd. Grammar review and SAT practice continue regularly.



MYTHOLOGY:

The Mythology class is journeying with Odysseus as we read Homer's *The Odyssey*. Additionally students have recently shared other adventures of Phaethon, Bellerophon and Pegasus, Otus and Ephialtes, and Daedalus. The class has learned how to wrap a toga and has researched Greek myths and constellations connected with the signs of the Zodiac. We had our own Bacchus Festival with Greek foods and sparkling "wine."

THEATER PRODUCTION:

Theatre Production students are working in groups on short films while learning the basics of film technique and film symbolism. Also, congratulations to all the students who worked with the play last month. You did a great job!

SCIENCE:

Biology students should be reviewing their notes and vocabulary on a daily basis. Please encourage your child to use Study Island as a review tool. The Biology HSA is Tuesday, May 17th. A.P. Biology students should review all of their notes and test for the A.P. test to be given on Monday, May 9th. Additionally, there are review books that may be signed out to help with studying. Please encourage your child to put forth the effort that is needed to be successful on the national exam. Biology students will be going to Assateague on Thursday, May 26th and permission slips will be sent home the beginning of May.

MARINE CORPS JUNIOR R.O.T.C.:

The annual JROTC Cadet Awards Ceremony will be conducted on Monday, 16 May beginning at 6:00 p.m. in the PHS auditorium. Each year we recognize outstanding cadet achievement in the areas of academics, leadership, and military skills by awarding medals and certificates presented by various veteran, patriotic, and fraternal organizations. Cadets need to be at the school by 5:00 p.m. for a free pizza social prior to the awards ceremony. The awards ceremony itself lasts approximately one hour. All family members and friends are encouraged to attend. Cadets have received parental permission slips for an all-day field trip on 20 May to attend a military air show at Andrews Air Force Base, followed later in the day by a visit to the Marine Barracks, Washington, DC to attend a concert by the Marine Band, Drum and Bugle Corps and drill demonstration by the Silent Drill Platoon. HIGH SCHOOL ASSESSMENTS:

The Maryland High School Assessments (HSA) are rapidly approaching, and we want to pass on some tips to help your child do their VERY BEST on the HSA. Here are a few things you can do to help your child do his/her very best on his/her test:

1. Make sure that your child gets plenty of rest. A well rested child will have the energy to work hard on their High School Assessments. To ensure your child gets plenty of rest, set up an earlier bedtime for the week. Explain how important a good night's rest is in doing well on the HSA.
2. Encourage your child to eat a healthy breakfast. Cereal with milk and fruit make for a great start. Drink some orange juice to charge up his/her brain power! Breakfast is very important and helps your brain to function properly. It is hard to concentrate on the HSA when your stomach is empty. Better yet, why not get up a little early and take your child out to breakfast one morning.
